A Message from Pastor Derrick

The Potter's Wheel Prophecy Part One Jeremiah 18:1-6

At The Potter's Wheel, We Learn:

- (1) The Potter has suitable materials to make something useful. (4) But the pot he was shaping from the clay was marred in his hands; so the potter formed it into another pot...
- (a) A burr and/or a rock in the vessel he finished crafting it on his wheel presented the potter with only two options: (1) throw out the vessel/clay or (2) reform and remake the vessel again.
- (b) The burr in the vessel of Israel was acknowledging God with their lips but turning a blind eye to their neighbor's plight (Isaiah 5:1-7)
- (c) The burrs we have both individually and collectively are in us, the clay. They are not in the hands of the potter. He exposes those burrs so that we have no other option but to beg him to make us into something different instead of throwing us out.
- (d) If Jesus judged us right now on the basis of how well we love our neighbor, we would all be thrown out. But we have a neighbor who first loved us instead to help us. His name is Jesus.
- (2) The Potter has a motive behind the reshaping (4) shaping it as seemed best to him..
- (a) Implies that He can hide his motives for reshaping us for reasons that only he knows.
- (b) When he chooses to do that, question of "why" may go unanswered.
- (c) The only option that's left is to choose to rest on his higher ways (Isaiah 55:9)
- (3) The Potter has a method he uses to reshape us (6) Can I not do with you, Israel, as this potter does?
- (a) First, he rids the clay of impurities and puts it back on the wheel (Ephesians 2:1-10)
- (b) Second, using nothing but his hands, the potter presses on top of the clay with his thumbs. He repeats this process 3 or 4 times because (a) it isn't easy to work with and (b) it increases the flexibility of the clay (2 Cor 4:8)
- (c) Third, it goes through the potter's heat kiln (Refiner's Fire)
- (d) Finally, it becomes suitable for holding treasured goods (2 Cor 4:7)
- (e) We cannot ignore this process or ask God to skip any part of it if we really desire his "good hand" of blessing upon us once again.

- (4) The Potter has a purpose for every vessel that's often far different from what the vessel desires (6) Like clay in the hand of the potter, so are you in my hand, Israel
- (a) Consider, for example, the most abused verse in the entire Bible for understanding how God works in our lives: Jeremiah 29:11.
- (b) "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not harm you, plans to give you a hope and a future."
- (c) What we want it to mean: Regardless of my actions, God will give me the best possible life.
- (d) What it really means: You, Israel, are going into bondage for 70 years because you refused to obey me. But I'm going to use you in your circumstances while in Babylon. You are going to canonize much of the Old Testament.
- (e) We cannot disconnect our lives from our actions. We are learning that now in our nation. But we can be sure God has a plan to use us in the way he wants to going forward.
